### **Cohasset EPC Report**

Hello Fellow Cohassians,

Now that we are moving from Fire Season and into Winter Season, it shifts our focus on our properties and while outdoors, to how we can still use our radios to help ourselves and our neighbors.

During Winter, we have trees fall that often block roads, patches of black ice that can cause accidents and cars spinning out and winding up in the ditch. Because of our terrain, cell phone coverage is slim to none in a lot of areas up here.

With the GMRS radios we are able to utilize either the Cohasset Repeater or one of the two County Repeaters – Bloomer and Platt – to relay requests for help and to alert each other of a potential hazard using our GMRS radios. The Butte County CERT program does still have a free radio assistance program for folks who just can't get a radio without help. The link to that is: <a href="https://buttecountycert.com/radio-help/">https://buttecountycert.com/radio-help/</a>.

Moving on to the AlertFM program. This program is another way to receive Code Red Alerts in the event of a life threatening emergency. The AlertFM program is not a new program, just new to us and our terrain. It is still having it's share of glitches which is to be expected.

Our County and the company which provides the equipment are continuing to work out the problems and make the AlertFM system more dependable. The receivers are small devices, about the size of a two packs of cigarettes and sits on your counter or hangs on your wall. You don't need to do anything once it is set up. The AlertFM receiver comes programmed for your actual street address and once you install a back up battery (for when our power fails) and turn it on, it automatically searches for an FM station and locks on.

They have these receivers here in Butte County and you simply go to the website linked below and fill out the application or call **(530) 552-6887**. Be sure to use your actual location here in Cohasset. We are in an area designated Extreme Fire so the device should still be free for Cohassians. ## News from the Cohasset Fire Safe Council

The Cohasset Fire Safe Council has been very active over the past couple of months.

In September we held a meeting for the children to learn about packing their go-bags. The meeting was an interactive meeting where the children packed a boy's go-bag and a girl's go-bag. In addition to clothing, parents were advised that the child's name and address needs to be in the go-bag, a meeting place needs to be written down and placed in the go-bag. Who the child may leave the hill with also needs to

be in writing in the child's go-bag, along with contact numbers for the parents and close relatives. This information is critical for law enforcement to help reunite the child with the parents in the event that the child becomes separated from the parent during a fire, for one reason or another.

The October meeting featured John Maretti, from

North Valley Animal Rescue. John talked about his organization, and how that organization can help during an evacuation. The hotline for North Valley Animal Rescue is 530-895-0000, if you need help evacuating animals, or rescuing your pets that may have been left behind, this is the number to call.

The next meeting of the Cohasset Fire safe Council

will be in February 2023. Everyone have a wonderful Thanksgiving and holiday season.

#### **Prescribed Fire in Cohasset**

Cohasset Ridge has been the recipient of many community grants in the last few years. We are very fortunate to be one of the remaining "green ridges" in Butte County that have not burned in the last decade. We have our very own, "Cohasset Forest Management Plan" and also the Butte County Forest Health Guidebook to assist us in successfully restoring our properties.

As we are learning, it is a big responsibility to steward our lands. Whether our lands are big or small acreages, it takes commitment and often help! Building or remodelling our homes to make them fire safe. Creating defensible space around homes allowing firefighters to potentially save them. Thinning our driveways, private roads and county roads for evacuation routes. Then, if our properties are larger, moving these lands with an ecological vision to where they are resistant and resilient to fire and climate change.

The grants we have received and will continue to receive in the coming years have allowed many landowners to have defensible space created, driveways and private roads cleared and our evacuation routes hardened. Some have taken advantage of My Sierra Woods, Natural Resources Conservation Service monies and others opportunities to masticate or have their trees thinned. Historically our forests were less crowded with larger trees and grasslands, created by fire.

Besides thinning, prescribed fire is another tool for landowners in Cohasset and several are using this ancient method of ecological restoration. Native Americans have utilized fire for thousands of years for food cultivation, hunting, gathering and dozens of other uses. Before the age of fire suppression, lightening or native American fires burned 5-12 million acres yearly in California. California landscapes evolved with fire. Now there are too many humans and infrastructure to let all wildfires burn. However, we know we can set fire to our lands to make them more like they were historically - resilient and healthy.

For many this is an unsettling thought!

Six fortunate Cohassians were able to attend the TREX (Prescribed Fire training Exchange) workshops this past month. Some took all 6 days of training others only two. These trainings are phenomenal opportunities to learn from professionals how to start "good fire" on our lands. This training is allowing folks from all over Northern California and beyond to become proficient in prescribed fire. The education contains medical, weather, equipment, cultural, communications, fire ecology and behaviour information with intense, hands on practice. This mostly volunteer team of hundreds in the North state will be available

to attend prescribed fire events on public and private lands (depending on experience and certification)

Chico State is educating and training fire practitioners at the University and at the Big Chico Creek Ecological Reserve to effectively plan and safely implement prescribed burns. Don Hankins, a professor at Chico State is known around the world regarding his expertise and knowledge of fire.

There is loads of information about prescribed fire and how it benefits our woodlands and neighborhoods on line. "The Lookout", is Zeke Lunders blog containing video and explanation. There is an excellent interview with Wolfy Roughly who started the Butte County Prescribed Burn Association.

Many property owners in Cohasset will be starting good fire in the coming months if the weather cooperates. Permits, clearing, inspections, volunteers, staff, equipment and good fire weather must be in place for everything to align. We may be able to have one of our local experts come to a Fire Safe Council in the future. We hope to have an "open house" or "look see" on one of these burns to allow others in Cohasset to see how the process works and ask questions. It is quite special and inspirational to work with many folks taking care of and maintaining our lands together
