# Cohasset CA Storm of 2023


Snomageddon! Snopocolipse! People on the hill will never forget the storm of '23!




### Mountain Music Starts

#### The following items will be accepted on a limited basis:

- . Tires: (up to 4 each) per vehicle removed from wheels
- Mattresses: box springs, and futon mattresses detached from frame or base (up to 4 each)
  per vehicle
- · Household Appliances excluding refrigerators, freezers, or any appliances containing compressed gas

#### The following items will NOT be accepted at this event:

- Hazardous Materials (batteries, paints, oils, chemicals, pesticides, smoke detectors, fluorescent lights, etc.)
- E-Waste or Universal Waste (televisions, video equipment, computer monitors, electronic devices of any kind)
- · Concrete, dirt, rocks, brick, asphalt, or sand
- · Treated Wood Waste
- · Asbestos of any type
- · Compressed gas

Residents of Butte County may visit https://bit.ly/37R2b5X to find information about disposing household hazardous waste. Once space is filled, waste may not be accepted.

# **1.4 Million for Cohasset Road Improvements**

Press Release

(Washington, D.C.) – Today, Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R – Richvale) announced that he obtained \$1,800,000 for the Roe Road Extension Project and \$1,400,000 for the Cohasset Road Widening and Fire Safety Project in Butte County.

The Roe Road Extension Project in Paradise would provide new intersections at streets that experienced a high volume of traffic-related fatalities as victims tried to safely evacuate during the 2018 Camp Fire. The Cohasset Road Widening and Fire Safety Project would improve the only route serving the area, which is in a location that is prone to wildfires. This project widens the existing roadway, adds expanded shoulders, drainage, and guardrail improvements to help emergency services as well as improve capacity in the event of evacuations.

"Making sure that rural escape routes are accessible for first responders and residents so they can evacuate during an emergency, like a wildfire, are critical. These projects will help prevent traffic bottlenecks, especially during emergencies and potentially save lives. Obtaining these federal funds to help Butte County and the town of Paradise to recover from our disasters and prepare to avoid new ones are examples of good expenditures that truly improve our quality of life," said Congressman LaMalfa.

# A Message from Senator Brian Dahle:

Dear Friends,

I know many of you, or someone you know, may have experienced a loss of work due to the recent winter storm. I wanted to reach out to let those impacted know that you might be eligible for disaster-related unemployment insurance. The EDD has waived the one-week waiting period for applying for unemployment for those affected by these recent storms.

My staff reached out to the EDD on how to apply for these funds. If you are applying online, there is a drop-down box to choose what separation category. From there choose "laid off/no work." Then under the separation explanation please choose the option "inclement weather."

If you are applying via mail with a paper application, on item 25g briefly explain the reason you are no longer working due to the winter storms. Additionally, on page 11 of the application make sure to explain how the winter storms have affected you.

If you have any questions or need additional assistance please reach out to my district offices and my staff will be more than happy to help. I hope you are staying safe and warm! Sincerely, Senator Brian Dahle

On Thursday, February 23<sup>rd</sup>, what was to become an historic winter storm began to settle down in Cohasset. We knew a storm was forecast, but no one could even imagine what it would look like after 2 weeks.

Most of us have the basic preparations to last at least a week – food, water, wood for stoves – and winter clothing and boots. However, even with good preparation going into this monster storm, I don't think anyone was completely prepared.

No plows started to work Thursday night. Friday morning came with over 2 feet of snow and Cohasset Road closed due to a down tree. We lost power and the snow kept falling. When the plows finally were able to get to Cohasset, they were underpowered and underequipped for the snow they encountered. It wasn't until late Friday night that an articulated road grader with blades was able to finally find Cohasset Rd. At least many of us had the GMRS radios and were able to check on one another and summon help.

The next two weeks, though March 9th, become a blur. We are calling them "Blurzdays", a name given to them by a dear neighbor. On Sunday, February 26th, several wonderful Cohassians got out their bobcats, tractors, 4x4's and set about trying to help dig out some driveways and private roads, and cutting through the snow berms left by the plows.

As neighbors were able to get out to go to town, they asked others if they needed anything. Gas for generators, propane for heaters and food were common requests. Several great men were walking supplies back to stranded, elderly neighbors who had run out. By the afternoon of the 28<sup>th</sup>, we were measuring 50.75" and it was still snowing. We had a couple of medical calls here that required Butte County Search and Rescue (SAR) to respond to help evacuate them to the waiting 4 wheel drive ambulances.

As bad as Cohasset Rd was, the other two county roads were barely I lane and the private roads nearly or completely impassible. Due to the severity of the storm and the fact it hit most of the state with the same ferociousness, even with a local declaration of emergency, there was just not much equipment available. Butte County C.E.R.T. was brought in to start getting emergency supplies

of food and propane out to those that could not get out of their homes.

On Saturday, March 4<sup>th</sup>, I received a call from CERT that they were at Station 22 with some supplies. Kathy Lawson, Nicole Regan and Seth Mitchell rushed down to the Station to take the supplies to be distributed as we learned of those in need.

By Thursday, March 9<sup>th</sup>, homes were being threatened with collapsing roofs due to the now 77" of snow. I know of at least 9 people who responded to one home to help save it from collapse and I am sure there are other testimonies I haven't heard of.

The biggest takeaway I have from these two weeks of unrelenting snow, is that we live in the best mountain community in the world. The quality and caliber of our neighbors, the care and concern shown by all was a testimony in itself. To live in a community where everyone pitched in to do what they could is beyond wonderful.

Now, looking forward. What have each of you learned? What preparations worked and which ones didn't? We have been looking over some of these questions in hopes to come up with some improvements.

As many of you know, I started the Emergency Preparedness Committee, at the request of the Cohasset Community Association Board of Directors, following a severe winter storm January 4, 2008. Many of my original volunteers are still active, joined by a few newer members. We will be scheduling a meeting in April to hopefully listen to your concerns, needs and offer up some suggestions. We can all learn from each other. Once again, no matter how much help the County might like to give us, we're on our own until they get

Take care, stay safe and hope to see you in April. The date will be announced.
